Our competitions are the backbone of the Royal Queensland Show (Ekka), bringing the city and country together each year to showcase the best of the best.

In 2023 the 144th Ekka was the most attended Show since 2019, since before the Covid-19 pandemic. Queensland's biggest and most loved event was an incredible success, attracting around 400,000 people.

We were delighted to once again reward and recognise our exhibitors across 54 competition sections. The RNA received over 20,000 competition entries, a 12% increase on 2022, which is also back to pre-pandemic levels.

More than 4,400 exhibitors travelled from across the country for their chance to win a coveted blue ribbon when the Ekka awards and celebrates the best of the best.

The entries included 4,257 prized animals, 1,231 cakes and condiments and 634 works by Queensland students.

Our competitors were able to share in a total prize pool of almost \$680,000 – a 10% increase on last year.

In 2023 we hosted 10 international judges, ensuring exhibits were judged by some of the world's most highly experienced and respected individuals.

In 2024, the nine-day Show will be held from Saturday 10 August to Sunday 18 August, running over two full weekends.

Since 1875, the RNA has been dedicated to championing agriculture and is honoured to stage Queensland's largest event on behalf of the community each year.

We look forward to continuing this wonderful legacy for future generations of exhibitors and patrons to enjoy.

- Exhibits being delivered to the RNA office (in person or via post) prior to official delivery days must be
 delivered to Reception Royal International Convention Centre, Gregory Terrace, Bowen Hills.
 Operating hours: 8:30am to 5pm, Monday-Thursday.
- All exhibits delivered must have the delivery label attached. Delivery labels will have address details of where the exhibit/s needs to be delivered. Individual items should be securely packaged to prevent any damage. Please ensure individual items are packaged together. The delivery label can be found on the Ekka website.
- Exhibit labels will be sent out via email after close of entries.
- No exhibits are to be delivered prior to Monday 1 July 2024.

CREATIVE ART AND CRAFT REGULATIONS

- 1. No factory-made goods are allowed.
- All work must be the work of the Exhibitor and must not have been exhibited at any previous Royal Queensland Show. Worn, laundered (unless otherwise stated), used or soiled work will not be accepted.
- 3. No refunds will be given for entries that are not presented or that do not adhere to the schedule.
- 4. No more than two (2) entries allowed for each Exhibitor in each class.
- 5. Each exhibit cannot be entered in more than one class.
- The Association may place in their correct classes exhibits considered entered in the wrong class.
- The Association reserves the right to declare no competition in any class in which there are less than three entries.
- 8. The Association reserves the right to display only such exhibits as it deems fit and practicable.
- Should any dispute arise for which no specific rule is laid down, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Council Steward, whose decision shall be final.
- 10. The officials of the Association will exercise all reasonable care with work submitted, but will not be responsible for the loss of, or any damage to the entry whilst in their custody. Exhibits will not be insured at the cost of the Association.
- 11. Should the Judge consider exhibits are not up to Royal Show Standard the Association may withhold any of the prizes.
- 12. The Judge's decision shall be final, no correspondence shall be entered into regarding this decision.
- 13. The Exhibitor irrevocably consents to the RNA publishing or reproducing in any manner whatsoever any particulars or information in relation to their exhibits; the publication or reproduction may be in a printed form or visual image through electronic means and/or on the internet.
- 14. Creative Art and Craft will be displayed in the Upper Royal International Convention Centre, Brisbane Showgrounds, 600 Gregory Terrace, Bowen Hills.
- 15. Exhibits will not be accepted unless entries are lodged with the Competitions Department, RNA, 600 Gregory Terrace, Bowen Hills, QLD 4006. <u>An exhibit label for each entry will be emailed after the close of entries. Please ensure each exhibit label is affixed to the corresponding exhibit.</u>
- 16. Each 1st, 2nd and 3rd place getter receives a ribbon, prize card and any other associated sponsorship depending of sponsorship received.

- 17. Cut off date for exhibitors to amend "price" on Article/s for Sale is Friday 28th June 2024. Exhibitors will not be able to change their mind at the last minute.
- 18. Due to storage restrictions, Exhibitors are requested to take any Exhibit packaging with them when personally delivering items.
- 19. Exhibitors are requested to place exhibit class/catalogue label on the underside of the garment or item (ie not on the front of the garment or article).

DATE OF ARRIVAL OF EXHIBITS

Stewards will ONLY be in attendance at the Brisbane Showgrounds on Tuesday 30 July 2024 from 9am until 5:30pm and Wednesday 31 July 2024 from 9am until 12pm to receive exhibits.

Any exhibits delivered in person or by post prior to the above dates must be delivered to Reception - Royal International Convention Centre, Gregory Terrace, Bowen Hills with a delivery label. Delivery labels are available on the Ekka site. Exhibits delivered by post must arrive between Monday 1 July and Friday 19 July 2024.

Exhibits should be dispatched (all charges prepaid) in sufficient time to reach the Showgrounds before the time and dates prescribed. Exhibitors are requested, when forwarding their exhibits to distinctly mark their parcels: e.g. CRAFTS, NEEDLEWORK, KNITTING, CROCHET etc.

COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS

Exhibits will be available for collection on presentation of entry receipt (emailed to the exhibitor after entries have been paid) at the Upper Royal International Convention Centre, Brisbane Showgrounds at the following times:

Creative Art & Craft exhibits can collect on Cookery Collection day, ONLY if the exhibitor has entered in both Cookery and Creative arts and Crafts Sections.

Creative Art and Craft only

Thursday 22 August 2024 between 9am and 5:30pm ONLY.

Cookery/Cake Decorating AND Creative Art and Craft only Monday 19 August 2024 between 10am and 5pm. Access via Loading Dock.

Cookery and Cake Decorating Exhibits will be disposed of if not claimed on Monday 19 August 2024 unless pre-arranged to collect with craft entries.

If you have entered both Creative Art & Craft and Quilts Across Queensland, you can choose to collect your Creative Art & Craft Exhibit on Quilt collection day on Friday 23 August 2024, 10am - 2pm. Please notify stewards on delivery day.

RETURN POSTAGE

For exhibitors wishing to have their entries returned by post, ALL RETURN POSTAGE MUST BE PREPAID. Whether your exhibit is posted in, or hand delivered the following must be supplied, return delivery instructions, a prepaid docket for freight, prepaid postage sticker or prepaid packaging, and prepaid insurance if needed.

<u>Creative Art and Craft Exhibits not collected within 10 days of the conclusion of the Show or return freight has not been paid, will be disposed of.</u>

SALES FOR ALL CLASSES

All exhibits offered for sale should have the price clearly indicated. The letters NFS should be used if the work is not for sale.

A commission of 10% will be charged by the RNA for work \$100 and under and 25% for work over \$100 sold during the Exhibition. Payment for sold items will be paid into your nominated bank account by end of October 2024.

Unless otherwise specifically stated in these regulations, no exhibit at the Royal Queensland Show is to be sold or offered for sale prior to 9am on the first day of the Show.

RNA YOUNG JUDGES COMPETITION

The RNA Young Judges Competition will be conducted at the Royal Queensland Show (Ekka) in 2024. This competition gives aspiring judges the opportunity to showcase their budding talents. This competition is open to competitors under 25 years of age.

Class 11 Any work using traditional letterforms or recognised materials and techniques on vellum

Must be framed, mounted or ready to display. Total overall perimeter including frame not to exceed 180cm overall.

CANVAS/TAPESTRY WORK

CANVAS/TAPESTRY WORK -**OPEN**

Size Limitation:

Exhibits must not exceed 70cm x 64cm (including frame). Exhibits may be under glass. Work must indicate canvas size used. Oversized exhibits will not be accepted.

Not to exceed 30cm in height. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

CERAMICS/POTTERY - JUNIOR

For exhibitors 16 years and under.

Class 28 Hand Built or Thrown Clay Work

Not to exceed 30cm in height. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

Class 29 Betty Slatter Christmas Decorations - Any Other Hand Made

The article can be constructed from any craft medium (eg; clay, felt, material, paper etc) and must have a Christmas theme. Use of sequins, beading, tinsel, holly etc is permitted. Garlands and Wreaths accepted. Use your imagination and be creative. No baked items. Not to exceed 60cm x 60cm.

Shank buttons, beads and twisted cord are not permitted in baby's wear.

Minimum of 20cm and not to exceed 60cm. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

Class 35 Rug or Knee Rug - All Crochet

Not to exceed 150cm x 150cm. No Embroidery. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

Class 36 Shawl - All Crochet

No Embroidery.

Class 37 Infant's Shawl, Cot or Pram Cover

First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

Class 38 Infant's Garment or Outfit up to 18 months.

Class 39 Child's Garment - Jumper, Cardigan, Jacket, Dress or similar.

Any technique - plain, textured, patterned. Any ply. 2 to 10 years old.

Any yarn. Maximum 3 ply to be used. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

Class 44 Any Article made by persons 70 years and over -

Not to exceed 150cm x 150cm. First: \$25; Second: \$15; Third: \$10

DECOUPAGE

DECOUPAGE - OPEN

Size Limitation:

Exhibits must not exceed 60cm x 60cm x 60cm. Oversized exhibits will not be accepted.

For lamp bases, lampshades will not be included in judging, but will be used in display. Exhibitors may submit a small sample of resources used to assist judges if considered necessary.

Judging Criteria:

Exhibits will be judged on quality and degree of difficulty in cutting, painting, design and finish. Originality and uniqueness of work will attract higher points.

Class 49 Bride Doll and/or Groom Doll

Clothing can be machine or hand sewn. Dolls are judged individually. Therefore you will need to enter each Doll individually if you are exhibiting a pair/couple.

If COVID-19 recommendations and mandates advised by the Federal and State Governments mean the competition class you entered cannot proceed, the RNA will issue a full refund of your entry fee.

NOTICE TO INTENDING EXHIBITORS

Entries for the Royal Queensland Show can ONLY be made online through our <u>Exhibitor Portal</u>. Entries submitted other than on the online portal will be returned to the Exhibitor and, unless all requirements are submitted online by 5.00pm on the Application to Enter closing date, as shown in the Schedule, they will not be considered.

As a condition for acceptance of all entries, all exhibitors/competitors agree to the following:

- All information submitted as part of my exhibitor profile is true and correct, including taxation status and bank account information.
- Neither myself nor my family members will indulge in any social, professional or other interaction with an official or judge contracted or sub- contracted by the RNA before or during the Royal Queensland Show.

PRIVACY STATEMENT

You can be assured that the privacy of your personal information is of the utmost importance to us. The information provided by you in any application for membership or application to enter is used by the Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland (RNA) to offer member services or to organize and conduct competitions at the Royal Queensland Show. By applying for membership or entering such competitions you consent to provide such details as your name, address and exhibit details. Competition information may be made available to the media and included in RNA publications.

The exhibitor irrevocably consents to the RNA publishing or reproducing in any manner whatsoever any particulars or information in relation to their exhibits; the publication or reproduction may be in a printed form or visual image through electronic means and/or on the internet. Your information will not be disclosed without your consent for any other purpose unless required by the law. PRIZE MONEY

- 1. Prize Money stated in the Schedule excludes GST.
- 2. All Prizes and Prize Monies are SUBJECT TO CHANGE at the discretion of the Competition Committee
- 3. GST will be added to the Prize Money for Exhibitors who are registered for GST purposes.
- 4. Prize money will be paid into your nominated bank account by 31 October following the Show.
- 5. The Association will provide a "Recipient Created Tax Invoice" to Exhibitors who are registered for GST purposes
- 6. All cash prizes and trophies must be claimed within six months from the closing date of the Royal Queensland Show. Prizes not claimed and by that date will be considered to have lapsed, and the amount will become a donation to the Association. (RNA By-Laws)

WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

- 1. The Brisbane Showgrounds are a designated Workplace within the meaning of the Workplace Health and Safety Act 2011 and exhibitors/competitors are required to ensure that they and all persons under their direction or control, including their contractors or sub-contractors, comply with all requirements of the Act and the RNA holds each exhibitor responsible to discharge its obligations to provide and maintain a safe place and system of work during occupation by the exhibitor of any area of the Showgrounds.
- Each exhibitor/competitor will assess the risk to themselves, staff, volunteers, family, other exhibitors, RNA staff, show visitors, children and any person foreseeably affected by the presentation of their exhibit.
- 3. Risks identified by exhibitors/competitors will be eliminated or controlled by the exhibitor/competitor and particular attention will be paid to ensuring public safety and safety of other exhibitors/competitors.
- 4. Exhibits will only be held and handled by competent persons whose experience is known to the exhibitor/competitor.
- 5. A "No Smoking Policy" will be strictly adhered to and policed by exhibitors/competitors and all are advised that the use of Primus stoves, any heating or lighting appliances of a like character, or any naked light, is strictly prohibited in the pavilions.
- 6. Any exhibitors/competitors intending to bring electrical equipment to the Showgrounds will be required to ensure that such equipment is fitted with residual current protection and that all electrical leads, tools and appliances have been inspected by a licensed electrical contractor and currently tagged. The use of double adaptors is prohibited, and all power boards must also be tested and tagged.
- 7. All exhibitors/competitors will comply with the requirements of the Act and its Regulations and Standards in every other respect. This is essential for the safety of all exhibitors/competitors and the general public. The Act imposes very severe penalties in the event of noncompliance with its provisions. Anyone who do not comply will not be allowed to exhibit at the Royal Queensland Show.
- 8. The Brisbane Showgrounds is subject to a Special Facility License issued under the Liquor Act 1992 and strict laws related to the consumption and possession of liquor across the Brisbane Showgrounds site. The consumption or possession of liquor outside of the licensed bar areas is not authorized by the RNA and in many cases may be an offence for which on the spot fines can be issued by Police and Liquor Licensing Investigators.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

- 132. It there is any inconsistency between By-laws 133 153 and any other By-laws of the Association, By-laws 133 153 will prevail.
- 133. The functions of the Disciplinary Committee shall be to hear and determine all complaints, allegations and other matters relating to:
 - a) prohibited substances, as defined in these By-laws or Sectional Regulations.
 - b) any alleged breach of the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association by an exhibitor and relating to an exhibit or to a competition, except if the alleged breach is of a kind that the Chairman of a Sectional Committee considers is of a less serious nature and should properly be dealt with by the Sectional Committee, and
 - any other alleged breach of the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association that may be referred to Disciplinary Committee pursuant to By-Law 137 (a).
- 147. The Disciplinary Committee may announce its decision orally or in writing. A decision that is announced orally shall have effect in accordance with its terms.
- 148. If the opinion of the Disciplinary Committee is not unanimous, the decision of the majority shall prevail. If the Disciplinary Committee are equally divided on any question concerning the guilt or innocence of a person, the question shall be resolved in that person's favour.
- 149. If the Disciplinary Committee considers that there has been a breach of the rules, By-laws or regulations of the Association, it may impose such a penalty as it considers to be appropriate, including without limitation:
 - a) a reprimand.
 - b) a monetary fine (payable at such time/s as the Disciplinary Committee may determine)
 - withdrawal or withholding of any award or ribbon.
 - d) disqualification in respect of any class.
 - e) expulsion from the Showground.
 - t) where the person concerned is a member, a suspension or termination of that membership.
 - g) a ban.
 - h) exclusion.
 - prohibiting a Person from exhibiting or competing at the current Show or at any future Show.
 - j) a direction that an Exhibit be removed from the Showground.
 - k) any other mandatory requirement; and
 - any other penalty provided for in other regulations of the Association.
- 150. There shall be no appeal from any decision of the Disciplinary Committee.

INSURANCE

- 161. The RNA may (but is not obliged to) take out a policy of insurance in respect of the legal liability on the part of an Exhibitor for loss or damage suffered by a third party caused by any act or omission of an Exhibit or the Exhibitor.
- 162. The RNA, RNA Staff Members and Officials of the RNA are not liable to any Exhibitor if the RNA fails to take out a policy of insurance effectively protecting any Exhibitor or Exhibit, or if any such policy does not operate to indemnify the Exhibitor in respect of the loss or damage in question.

REGULATIONS & BY-LAWS

All Entries and Exhibitors are subject to RNA Regulations and By-Laws set out in this schedule as well as other By-Laws that may pertain to this competition.

The RNA always reserves the right at its absolute discretion without assigning any reason to:

- a) substitute a Judge when necessary.
- b) re-allocate Judging days for a particular breed.
- c) if entries numbers require an extra Judge, appoint an additional Judge if necessary.
